# **Photograph**

This Newsletter's photographs of an Enigma machine and the accompanying box of rotors (4 of 8 for Kriegsmarine, 3 of 5 for Wehrmacht), along with bullet points of Enigma facts and historical events, come from a Power Point presentation that my good friend, Jerry Mason, gave to a group of amateur radio operators not long ago. For a short, concise, yet fact-filled summary of Enigma, I don't think you can beat this slide. Great job, Jerry!

# Enigma Machine

- German Navy bought Enigma in 1926
- Keyboard with only 26 letters no numbers
- 3 of 5 rotors were changed daily along with their ring settings and start positions (4 of 8 rotors after 1942) + 1 of two reflectors
- Each press of a key advanced the rotors 1 step
- Plugboard used 10 cables switching 20 of 26 letters
- Pressing a key sent a current through the plugboard – the rotors – the reflector – the rotors – plugboard and then lit a bulb





- In practice 10<sup>23</sup> possible key settings
- Naval Enigma remained unbroken until 1941 when the Short Signal weather code book was captured from U-110
